Copyright and Course Readings: Considerations for Online Faculty

Copyright is an area of law that provides creators or distributors of "original works of authorship" with an incentive to share their works by granting them the right to be compensated when others use those works in certain ways. When Online Faculty want to use articles and/or portions of books as readings in online courses, copyright must be considered.

There are three ways copyrighted materials (journal articles and/or portions of books) may be distributed to students:

1. Direct Link

If the material is available online – either freely on the Web or through one of Wellehan Library's online resources – a link in ANGEL may be provided. Linking does not violate copyright law since no copying is involved.

2. E-Reserves

Digital copies of limited amounts of copyrighted works may be placed on e-reserve in ANGEL.

Journal Articles

E-Reserves may be used if the journal issue containing the article(s) is

- covered by the College's Academic Copyright License,
- lawfully owned by either the Library or the faculty member*, AND
- the faculty member wants to use no more than two articles from the one issue.

Portions of Books

E-Reserves may be used if the book is

- covered by the College's Academic Copyright License,
- lawfully owned by either the Library or the faculty member*, AND
- the faculty member wants to use no more than two chapters or 20% of the book.

For e-reserves, contact Chuck Prinn at the Wellehan Library. He will need two things -

- 1. a complete citation for each item
 - o Journal article author, title, journal title, volume, issue, date, and page numbers
 - o Portion of a book author, title, publisher, publication date, ISBN, page numbers
- 2. if the Library does not own the journal/book, a good quality scanned copy of each article/portion of a book

^{*} If neither the Library nor the faculty member owns a lawful copy of the journal, the faculty member may obtain a copy of an article through interlibrary loan, but then may only put <u>one</u> article per issue on e-reserves.

^{*} If neither the Library nor the faculty member owns a lawful copy of the book, the faculty member may obtain a copy of the book through interlibrary loan, but then may only put one chapter or no more than 10% on e-reserves.

3. Coursepack

For materials not covered by the College's Academic Copyright License and/or in amounts exceeding the limits of e-reserves, a coursepack is necessary.
